On the cover

This month's cover image is from GSACC's archives. This image is *Bottle Brush*, by former GSACC member Terry Ruvalcaba. It is from 2008.

Selecting an image for each month's *Flash* cover sometimes isn't easy. We receive many good images in our competitions each month. However, occasionally I can't seem to find one that works well for the cover.

For the cover, an image has to work well with text around it. Many vertical images don't work well with text at the top:



As you can see from the example at the bottom of the previous column, the text covers the top of the tulips. One option would be to re-size the photo and place it below the text, bur that can leave too much blank space on the sides.

In a few issues of the *Flash*, I've tried some other layouts, including placing the title at the side or bottom of the cover. Looking back, some of those layouts looked okay at the time, but I wouldn't try them again today.

I started publishing the *Flash* with the October 2007 issue, and introduced covers that showcase photos with the September 2012 issue. While my preference is to use current photos for newsletter covers, I have an archive with images that may make good covers. So, I may occasionally use some of those.

One other challenge in finding suitable cover images is that I have to choose photos that will look good in monochrome for the few members who receive printed issues. Too much black ink can cause printer jams.

I also like to use a variety of photos. For example, if a photo of a bird is on the cover one month, I will choose a different subject the next month. Covers could easily become "bird of the month" pages.

That concludes this behind-the-scenes look at the making of the *Flash*.

Digital image rules revisited

August is a digital competition month. I receive quite a few digital entries that do not have correct title formats. As a reminder, here are GSACC's ruled for naming and submitting files:

Digital images should be a minimum of 1024x768. Any digital files that are too small may not project properly.

When labeling entries, use P for Pictorial, N for Nature, A for Assignment categories, PJ for Photojournalism, C for Color, M for Monochrome, your initials, and the Image title name. Please note the _ (underscore) which is not a - (dash). In the case of two people having the same first and last initials then three initials must be used: i.e. LJM for Lance J. Meyer.

For the two Pictorial image categories, use a file name for the image which indicates the category and whether it is color or monochrome. Example: P_C_LM_Church.jpg

There is no need to indicate color or monochrome for the other three categories since all entries (color and monochrome) in each category will be judged together. Example: N_LM_Bird.jpg

Digital participants should make sure that their image files are properly titled. If the files are not labeled correctly by the maker, they will not be used. The competition chairman will not guess which category the maker intended to enter.

File name format examples:

Pictorial Color: P_C_AK_Title Pictorial Monochrome: P_M_AK_Title Nature: N_AK_Title Photojournalism: PJ_AK_Title Assignment: A_AK_Title Creative: CR_AK_Title

Here are some common mistakes that I've seen:

 Not naming the file, I usually make an effort to determine the intended category/ However, sometimes I'm not able to determine the photographer's intentions.
Submitting multiple entries for categories. Remember, only one submission is allowed for each category. If I receive multiple submissions from one photographer for a category, I will use whichever entry I received first.
Putting C or M with Nature, Photojournalism or Assignment. There is no need to indicate if these images are color or monochrome.

4. Starting the image title with "C", so I'm not sure if it is supposed to be placed in Pictorial Color or Creative.

Please keep in mind that title mistakes could cause entries to be placed in wrong categories, or removed from competition if the category can't be determined. Please email me if you gave questions or need help with naming files.

Add some text, a saying, a description. "Visit This Place or That", "Come Party with us", "A penny for your thoughts", "Happy margarita day" == whatever fits your image.

Then print it on 4x6 paper, color or black and white. This could not be simpler/ Let's keep it to only 3 cards per member.

Keep your name and any identifying information on the back of the print.


